Our department is part of the Faculty of Arts and Science at Rutgers Newark. We have 11 full-time faculty members and 5 part time lecturers. All full-time faculty are research active scholars and share an interest in applied research. The department maintains an active seminar program. We offer B.A. and M.A. degrees in arts and sciences. Last year we awarded 65 BAs and 9 MAs. Each year we teach basic principles of micro, macro and statistics to over 750 students. We also teach core graduate courses (micro, macro and econometrics) to Ph.D. students in the Rutgers Business School, international economics courses to graduate students in the Division of Global Affairs, and advise PhD students in the School of Public Affairs and Administration.
